This bronze sculpture shows an image of Panchmukhi Hanuman, from the 15th century A.D.—This multi-armed image of Panchmukhi Hanuman is standing on a black base holding various attributes in his hands.

Each head is that of a deity associated with Vishnu and is depicted to be facing a cardinal direction: Hanuman faces the east, Narasimha faces the south, Varaha faces the north, Garuda faces the west, and Hayagriva faces the sky.

Panchmukhi Hanuman can also be spelled as Pancmukhi, Panchamukhi, Pancamukhi or Pañcamukhī Hanumān

SANDSTONE BUDDHA MUCHALINDA SOUTH-EAST ASIA 11TH CENTURY

Khmer. Angkor period. 11th/12th century Bayon style.
Sandstone with natural patina, unrestored condition.
The crowned Buddha with his hands in dhyana mudra sits in ardha padmâsana on the rolled-up body of the Naga king Muchalinda, who has stretched his seven heads behind the Buddha's head to form a mandorla.

The depiction shows a mythological event from the life of the historical Buddha. One day, while he was meditating, there was a storm and heavy rain. Then Muchalinda, the king of the Nagas (snakes), appeared from a nearby lake and invited the Buddha to sit on his curled-up body. He stretched his seven heads over the Buddha's head to protect him. When the rain stopped, Muchalinda resumed his royal form, bowed and returned to his kingdom.

SWEET SHADAKSHARI LOKESHVARA BRONZE GILT TIBETAN 15TH CENTURY

Dimensions: Height 10,3 cm ; Wide 7 cm ; Depth 4,5 cm Weight: 182,5 grams

The four-armed bodhisattva seated in dhyanasana on a double-lotus base, his primary hands folded in anjalimudrain front of his heart, clad in a dhoti incised with a foliate pattern and a shawl incised with a cloud pattern, adorned with multiple beaded necklaces, bracelets, earrings and tiara inlaid with hardstones, the hair piled into a high chignon.

Shadakshari Avalokiteshvara, the four-armed form of the *bodhisattva* of supreme compassion, is believed to be the embodiment of the Buddhist mantra *om mani padme hum*, ("hail to the jewel in the lotus"). These six syllables represent the six realms of existence: *Om* is white and stands for the god realm, *ma* is green and stands for the demigod or Asura realm, *ni* is yellow and stands for the human realm, *pad* is blue and stands for the animal realms, *me* is red and stands for hungry ghost realm, *hum* is black and stands for the hell realm. Shadakshari ushers all beings from the six realms into enlightenment.

INDIAN 16TH CENTURY SEATED SILVER GANESHA INSCRIBED AT THE BACK

Traditionally depicted four-armed Ganesha mandorla and decorative supporting elements atop the stepped base suggest a provenance of northern India. In the regions surrounding the Sultej river, many of the arts of Kashmir were absorbed, but retained in a more folkish style. The deep grooves that give volume to Ganesha's ears are a stylistic choice frequently made in the sculptures of Himachal Pradesh.

The mandorla itself, with circular details surrounding the outer band, is reminiscent of works from Uttar Pradesh.

Next to Ganesha we assume it's a rat and his brother Kartikeya The backside shows traces of an inscription

He is standing on a double reverse lotus base, wearing trousers and anklets, a belt and shirt with beaded necklaces and belts, armlets and bracelets.

His head is gazing towards his raised hand.

The bearded face with moustache and small goaty is smiling slightly with attentive eyes, the curls of hair peaking out underneath a five-pointed tiara encircling the high chignon.

Looking at the back we see a rectangular opening of the statue, the bottom reveals two small holes.

Anjaneya is the name of Lord Hanuman, which expresses his identity as the son ('eya') of Anjana. He is the son of Vayu and Anjana and is known for his invincible strength and bravery. He stands on a square plinth of an inverted lotus flower, tall and stately, his right hand raised in blessing while the left hand holds a goat with its head turned upwards. The posture is thus gentle and generous, unlike the usual warrior iconography of Hanuman.

BRONZE NANDI WITH SILVER EYES INDIA 18TH CENTURY

The Nandi here is reclining on a oval pedestal. It is wearing garlands of beads with a bell. One of the distinguishing features is the Lingam (aniconic representation of the Hindu deity, Siva) in front of the Nandi, in front of the feet. This feature of Nandi, with a small Lingam in front of it, is more commonly seen in Karnataka. This Nandi was probably used in a home shrine and has significant wear and tear.

Nandi (bull) is the sacred vehicle (vahana) of Siva and is considered to be the foremost devotee of Siva.

As Siva is the rider of the bull, every Siva temple will have a shrine for stone image Nandi, in reclining form as above, in front of and facing Siva. In the early Tamil literature, Nandi is synonymous with Siva. There are temples dedicated to Nandi, especially in Karnataka, India.

The above Nandi is from Karnataka is probably from late 18th century.

This chubby Ganesha is particularly charming, with wonderfully curvy ears and ornate jewellery.

He holds the usual attributes, his own broken-off tusk in the right hand and a sweet or Laddus in his left hand.

STANDING BRONZE PAGAN BUDDHA 13TH CENTURY

buddha on rimmed round base above lotus plinth resting on 4 feet (one broken) the left arm raised to the body holding his wide garment , the right arm showing a mudra. This standing bronze Buddha comes from Pagan, the capital city of an eponymous kingdom that flourished in Myanmar (formerly Burma) between the ninth and thirteenth centuries. Situated along the Irrawaddy River, Pagan was once home to thousands of Buddhist temples, monasteries, and stupas. This sculpture exhibits iconographic and stylistic continuities with roughly coeval portable bronze images cast in southeastern India. Note, for instance, the frilled multi-hem of the Buddha's gossamer *sanghati* (monastic robe), which is a common feature of Buddhist processional bronzes from the coastal entrepôt of Nagapattinam. This sculpture thus attests to the robust networks of exchange across the Indian Ocean.

GREEN TARA BRONZE NEPAL 16TH CENTURY

Superbly cast, seated in lalitasana on a double lotus pedestal with a finely beaded rim, her right foot resting on a lotus blossom, her right hand lowered in varada mudra and her left raised in vitarka mudra, holding a lotus stem in each coming to full bloom at her shoulders, wearing a dhoti with exquisitely carved folds gathered at the feet and fastened at the waist by a beaded girdle. Her elaborate crown, necklaces, arm, and ankle bands are finely inlaid with precious stones.

Green Tara, also known as Shyamatara, is venerated as a saviour and liberator from samsara, the earthly realm of birth and rebirth. According to Buddhist mythology, Green Tara emerged from a lotus bud rising from a lake of the tears of Avalokiteshvara, shed for the suffering of all sentient beings. She embodies compassion in a dynamic form, hence the usual depiction of the goddess with right leg outstretched, ready to leap out to ease suffering. Her right hand is always held out in varada mudra, a gesture of compassion and charity, and the left hand in vitarka mudra, a gesture of teaching.

The goddess wears a high, multi-tiered crown, ample jewellery and a fabulous, finely striped, ankle-length dhoti. Her breasts are prominent and emphasise her sensuousness.

This is a particularly fine, small bronze. It dates to the 14th century and possibly earlier.



GROUP OF THREE NEPALESE 16TH CENTURY BRONZE SCULPTURES (INDRA + CONSORTS)

Museum quality and very rare group of three statues representing Indra and his consorts.

Indra is sitting in "vajrasana" on a lotus throne, his left hand resting on his knee, his right hand in "vitarka mudra". Indra has his forehead showing the third eye horizontally, and is wearing an elaborate crown, jewels and a "dhoti". A lotus is attached to each shoulder. The lotus on the right, supporting the typical "vajra", allows, together with the horizontal third eye, to identify the central statue as to be Indra.

The two goddesses are sitting in "lalitasana" on a lotus throne, with a lotus attached to one shoulder. The goddess on the left has her hand in "abhaya" mudra. The three statues, as well as their thrones, were cast separately. They are attached to one another via tenons affixed on the goddesses' thrones.

This group is typical of the Newar sculpture of Nepal, is made of gilt copper and dates back to the 15th/16th century. The statue of the right-side goddess suffered an old accident at its base, but without great damage.

Part of the gilding is erased with age, but the whole triad is in every good condition.

Portraying the historical Buddha Shakyamuni, this bronze probably emerged from a Tibetan monastery, like most other Gupta period (c. 300-600) bronzes.

Perhaps this bronze survived because it was taken to Tibet as a sacred relic or souvenir.

The Buddha's slim and graceful body is revealed by his transparent monastic robes. His right hand displays the gesture of reassurance while the left hand holds the end of his robe.

Ganesha, lord of obstacles, can both create and remove challenges to success, and he is worshiped for his divine favour. In Nepal, where this sculpture was made, both Hindus and Buddhists worship Ganesha. He is associated with abundance and wealth, as his well-fed body suggests. His favourite sweets, held in a bowl in his lower left hand, are always in plentiful supply, and the radish held in his lower right hand carries associations with fertility and abundance. Here, Ganesha also holds a axe his upper left hand; his upper right hand holds prayer beads. The trunk that reaches into the bowl of sweets. This sculpture may have been made for a Hindu or Buddhist devotee; both traditions worship Ganesha.

Krishna is the only incarnation of Vishnu to be worshipped as a child, a youth or a lover.

The figures were mostly made in India over a period spanning eleven hundred years and were produced for use in temples or in household shrines and by pilgrims.

As an example of Hindu iconography, this image represents one of the worlds great and ancient religious traditions. Hinduism is as much a philosophy and culture as it is a religion, a rich and complex aggregate which has drawn on a collection of holy books and incorporated a wide range of influences since its origins around 4000 years ago. The multiple deities, demi-gods and heroes of the Hindu pantheon and Hindu literature reflect the syncretistic nature of Hinduism in their diverse forms and complex lineages, and are represented in a magnificent corpus of figurative sculptures, large and small. These images were intended to remind people of spiritual truths and sacred stories and to function as aids to meditation. They follow forms and dimensions that are carefully prescribed for each deity, and all parts and attributes such as the position of the body, the emblems and ornaments, and the accompanying minor divinities have significance.

Conventionally, Ganesha's ten arms hold ten attributes which include a lotus, a pomegranate, a *gada* (mace), a *chakra* (discus), his own broken tusk, a *pasha* (noose), a jewelled water vessel or a pot of jewels, a blue lotus, a rice sprig, and a sugarcane bow.

This is Ganesha's vahana, or celestial vehicle.

Mahaganapati represents Ganesha as the Supreme Being and is thus the most important deity of the Ganapatya sect (a denomination of Hinduism that worships Ganesha as the Saguna Brahman or supreme deity). This version particularly symbolises happiness, wealth and magnificence of Ganesha.

There is a fine and varying patina. Overall, the casting of this bronze is at an extremely high level.

The right leg is extended along his, while the left leg is wrapped around his neck. She wears a crown and decorated with many ornaments. One of a kind. Originally from India.

Mahakala is the terrific manifestation of Avalokiteshvara, the Bodhisattva of compassion. He is a fierce protector and a guardian of the Dharma and its adherents. There are seventy-five forms of Mahakala, each with a different origin and a different name. The Six-Armed Mahakala is especially powerful in his ability to destroy or conquer enemies The Six-Armed Mahakala, also known as Nyingshuk. The accomplishment of the six perfections (shad-paramita), which bodhisattvas cultivate and bring to perfection throughout their training, is symbolized by the Six Arms. The six perfections are,

The perfection of

Generosity (dana-paramita)

Morality (shila-paramita)

Peace (shanti-paramita)

Vigor (virya-paramita)

Meditation (dhyana-paramita)

Insightful Wisdom (prajna-paramita)

A Bhuta, according to the Tulu civilization and culture, is a human spirit who lived life as a hero, and was canonized after his or her tragic, martyred death. They are generally benevolent forms of ghosts, who act as guardians over their worshipers. Each Bhuta has a unique cult following, and thus, each Bhuta mask is extremely unique. This antique mask, dated to the 15th century, made of brass, used to be kept in a shrine as per the tradition in Karnataka, starting from the 7th Century Ganga dynasty. In practice, the mask was used to channelize the spirit and have an interactive worshiping session between the devout and the bhuta. Much like an Ouija board in the west, the Bhuta masks in Karnataka were used to address societal and personal practical questions, and come to a communal consensus. A similar custom known as "They yam" is followed in the North Malabar region of Kerala.

The Bhuta worship itself to diverse art forms, including masks sculpted in bronze or carved in wood. Broadly Bhutas are classified into four categories with masks of brass, bronze and wood representing the invoked spirit.



This iconographic choice seems to be limited to Himachal Pradesh and is not generally found in other Indian sculpture. The present work is distinguished by the unusual nimbus, which is characterized by a band of circular apertures; in contrast, most bronzes from Himachal display a plain, conjoined nimbus-aureole.

Lord Ganesha is one of the most worshipped deities in the Hindu pantheon of gods. He is known as the Lord of Success and Prosperity, and the Remover of Obstacles. Images and sculptures of Lord Ganesha are found in many homes, touted to bring happiness and prosperity into your life.

The demon was thrilled because he saw the most beautiful woman he had ever seen. Of course he wanted to possess her immediately. She rejected him harshly, but then explained to him shamefully that she would only consider sex with her husband. Bhasmasura then wanted to marry her immediately, of course, but she refused. She could only marry someone who could dance as well as she could. When she performed a step in which she held her hand above her head and the demon copied it, the Asura burned himself to ashes. With this, Vishnu had once again saved the world.

In Thailand, the heads were melted apart and then attached to the bodies with rivets. It explains why their lower part have a very regular cut, with sometimes, as here, a tear at the point of their fixation.

In 1350, a prince of U Thong founded Ayutthayā, took the name of Rāmathibodi 1 and unified Thailand, then called Siam. Ayutthayā will remain the capital until it is captured by the Burmese in 1767.

This long period saw the development of a rich, stylistically very varied art, mixing with an infinite variety the aesthetics of the various previous Thai schools. This majestic head presents a happy synthesis between the canon of the art of Sukhothai according to the workshops of Kampheng Phet and the U-Thong C style. From the workshops, the head resumes the general features of the face; from the U-Thong C style are the hairstyle descending sharply in the middle of the forehead, the brow ridges in high relief and the ears with the distended lobes spiking outwards.

Virabhadra, a great herowarrior, arose from this hair. He cut off Daksha's head in his rage and hurled it into the sacrificial fire. After the other gods calmed Shiva down, Daksha's head was replaced by that of a goat or in this case, a ram. Daksha later became a devotee of Shiva.

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- 15. Der Ersteigerer ist verpflichtet, die Gegenstände sofort nach der Auktion in Empfang zu nehmen. Mit der Übergabe geht die Gefahr für nicht zu vertretende Verluste und Beschädigungen auf den Käufer über. Die Versendung ersteigerter Sachen auf Wunsch des Käufers, der Unternehmer ist, geschieht auf dessen Kosten und Gefahr. Die Kosten einer Transportversicherung trägt der Käufer. Nach Anlieferung hat der Käufer, der Unternehmer ist, die Sachen unverzüglich auf Transportschäden zu untersuchen und diese dem Transportunternehmen anzuzeigen; spätere Reklamationen wegen nicht verdeckter Schäden sind ausgeschlossen.

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- 19. Soweit die Auftragsbedingungen in mehreren Sprachen vorliegen, ist die deutsche Fassung maßgebend.

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- 4. Every bidder must give their name and address before the start of the auction. This also applies when they participate in the auction as a representative. In this case, they must also give the name and address of the person they are representing. In cases of doubt, the bidder makes a purchase in their own name and on their own account.

Every bidder must provide a cash deposit before the start of the auction.

5. In order to make sure that the written rules are implemented, they must be entered onto the form provided for the purpose – at least 24 hours before the start of the auction at the auction house. The bidder must provide evidence that they have been received. Precise information regarding the individual or company of the bidder and the lot number must be submitted in order for a written bid to be effective. When a bid is submitted, a telephone number must be given at which the bidder can be regularly contacted. The bid is restricted solely to the given lot number. Written offers will only be considered by the auction house with the amount required in order to out-bid another bid that has been submitted. A precondition for telephone participation is a written notice received at least 24 hours prior to the start of the auction day by the auction house. The auction house bears no liability for the realisation or maintenance of telephone communication connections and the correct transfer and receipt in due time of online offers to the auction house. Of decisive importance for the auction and its progression are the events in the hall (e.g. with regard to revisions in accordance with item 1b). Only those bids submitted in the hall are binding.

The auction house may reject bids if objective reasons are provided. This applies in particular when at the request of the auction house, bidders can provide no sufficient securities prior to the auction which correspond to the value of the bid. If a bid is rejected, the bid submitted immediately prior to it remains binding.

- 6. The bid is accepted after it has been called to the highest bidder three times. The auctioneer may refuse to accept the bid or accept it on condition; in the latter case, the bidder is bound to their bid for a period of 2 weeks. If several bidders submit the same bid, and no higher bid is offered after the bid is called three times, the matter is decided by lot. The auctioneer may withdraw acceptance of the bid and offer the object again if a higher bid that has been submitted in due time has erroneously been overlooked, or if the highest bidder does not wish their bid to remain valid, or if there is any other doubt regarding acceptance of the bid.
- 7. The auctioneer may offer the lot for the vendor up to the agreed minimum purchase price (limit) without indicating this, and regardless of whether other bids have been submitted or not. In order to protect the object provided for sale, the auctioneer may accept a bid below the limit to the vendor: this is a case of reversal.
- 8. Bids may be submitted prior to the auction in written form or by e-mail. They are brought into play by the auctioneer only to the extent required in order to outbid other bids.
- 9. On lots marked with (R), the commission of 28% is added to the hammer price, and the legally valid VAT of 19% is also added to the total (hammerer price + commission).

On all other lots, the commission of 33 % is added to the hammer price. The VAT is included and cannot be separately shown (margin scheme).

10. Dispatches to third countries are not subject to VAT and – on provision of the VAT ID no. – this also applies to companies in EU member states. Should purchasers bring purchased objects into third countries themselves, they are reimbursed the VAT as soon as the auction house receives the certificate of export from the customs office and the certificate of import from the importing country.

Invoices presented during or directly after the auction must be checked; errors are to this extent excepted. $\[$

The re-writing of invoices entails additional effort and is therefore subject to a fee.

- 11. The total amount is due on acceptance of the bid, and is payable in cash or through a cheque confirmed by the bank. Payments from successful external bidders who have bid in writing, via e-mail or by telephone, are due within 7 days following the date of invoice.
- 12. The auction house retains the right to assert claims due to the client which it is representing in their own name including before a court.
- 13. Ownership of the purchased items is only transferred to the purchaser following full receipt of payment by the auction house.
- 14. If payment is delayed, default interest at the level of the standard bank interest rate, although at least at the level of the legal default interest rate in accordance with §§ 288, 247 of the German Civil Code, can be demanded without prejudice to any further damage compensation claims including legal costs. If due to the delayed payment damage compensation is demanded in lieu of performance, this can be calculated such that the object is re-auctioned in a new auction, and the defaulting purchaser, whose rights from the previous purchase are void and who is prohibited from making a further bid, is liable for a minimum revenue and costs arising through the additional sale, and has no claim to any potential profit.
- 15. The successful bidder is obliged to take receipt of the objects immediately after the auction. With the transfer, the risk for losses and damage for which there is no responsibility is transferred to the purchaser. The dispatch of purchased items at the request of the purchaser who is the contractor occurs at their own cost and at their own risk. The costs of transport insurance are borne by the purchaser. Following delivery, the purchaser, who is the contractor, must immediately inspect the objects for transport damage and report this to the transport company; later complaints arising from non-covert damage are excluded.
- 16. The place of fulfilment and place of jurisdiction for the commercial transaction is Radevormwald. German law applies; the UN Convention on Contracts for the International Sale of Goods (CISG) does not apply.

- 17. These conditions also apply accordingly for post-auction sale which is a part of the auction; the right of revocation and return for long-distance contracts does not apply.
- 18. Should one of the above conditions be entirely or partially ineffective, the validity of the others remains intact.
- 19. Insofar as the conditions of contract are provided in several languages, the German version is decisive.

- 1.拍卖行以卖方的名义并代表委托方(卖方)进行拍卖。
- 拍卖以下文中的条件为基础,该条件将以当面、书面、电话或网页在线的方式就拍卖进行说明。
- 2.拍卖行有权统一或分开拍品编号,无需提供或参考一定的顺序。
- 3.在拍卖前可对所有参加拍卖的物品进行检查和检测。参拍物品均为二手物品。物品在拍板时间点上,处于拍板状态。拍卖行所采用的目录详细信息不是购买法意义上的物品质量保证或担保。根据潜在买家的要求,拍卖行所提供的品相报告 (Condition Reports) 仅可作为拍卖行自身评估拍品外部状态的大致参考。只要买家履行谨慎行事的职责,则其不对缺陷承担责任,拍卖行则须接受该买家。并须及时将提供给拍卖行的、有依据的缺陷反馈告知卖方,同时,有效期限为落锤后的十二个月。但在任何情况下,退货的前提为:拍品的品相状态与拍卖时相比未发生任何变化。
- **4.**在拍卖前,每名参拍者都需给出其姓名和地址。参与拍卖的代理人也需给出上述信息。在此情况下,其还需给出被代理人的姓名和地址。如有疑问,则参拍者以自己的名义代表自己进行咨询。
- 在拍卖前,每名参拍者都需交付一定的现金押金。
- 5.为确保书面竞拍的执行,必须在拍卖开始前至少 24 小时将针对此规定的表格寄送到拍卖行。参拍者进入拍卖场时须出示证件。为了确保竞价有效,参拍者或参拍公司须提供拍品的确切信息和拍品编码(LOT号)。竞价时须给出参拍者可正常接听的电话号码。仅可用给出的竞拍号进行竞拍。针对书面竞拍、拍卖行仅采纳为超出其他参拍者所给竞价而所需的金额。电话参拍的前提为:最迟在拍卖日开始前的 24 小时前将书面文件送抵拍卖行。拍卖行不对电话联系的执行或维持成功与否、正常通知、在线竞拍及时出价负责。拍卖和其流程的决定性因素为拍卖现场情况(例如基于第1b点的调整)。仅在拍卖现场给出的竞价具有购买约束力。

拍卖行有权在出示客观原因后拒绝接受参拍者。此条尤其适用于: 当参拍者在拍卖前无法满足拍卖行的要求, 为竞拍提供足够价值的担保时。在拒绝某一竞拍的情况下, 此前最近所提供的竞价仍然有约束力。

- **6.**三次报告最高竞价后,可落锤。拍卖行可拒绝落锤同时保留该拍品;**2**周内最后一次竞价对参拍者具有购买约束力。如果多个参拍者给出同一竞价额,且三次报告最高竞价后没有更高竞价,则抽签决定中拍者。如果错过了及时提交的更高竞价,或最高竞价者欲取消出价,或对落槌价存在质疑,则拍卖行可撤回落锤价,并重新举锤该物品。
- **7.**拍卖行可为卖方将物品以高达协定的最低价格(底限)的价格售至拍品编号,无需对此做出说明,且与是否存在其他竞价无关。为保护出售物品,拍卖行将拍品以低于最低价格落锤给卖方,此种情况视为退回物品。
- 8.可在拍卖前以书面形式或邮件形式进行参拍。当有必要时,仅出于超出其他参拍者的竞价的目的,拍卖商才会采纳其全额。
- 9.在落锤价的基础上加上 28% 的差价, 在总数(落锤价+差价)的基础上再加上 19% 的营业税。
- **10**.发往第三国和(在给出营业税号的情况下)欧盟国家内的企业时,无需支付营业税。如果竞价成功者自主将所获拍卖物品运送至第三国,则向拍卖行出示海关过关凭证和抵达国入关凭证后,将立即向其退返营业税。
- 需对在拍卖期间或拍卖刚结束时生成的发票进行核查;其中可能存在错误。
- 重开发票时会产生一定耗费,因此需支付一定费用。
- 11. 总金额应付附加费,并以现金或银行认证支票支付。通过电子邮件或电话以书面形式提交的外国竞拍者应在发票日期后7天内完成付款。
- 12.针对其所代表的委托人产生的权利要求,拍卖行被授权以自己的名义(也包括司法上)进行有效处理。
- 13.仅当买主支付全部款项后,才能从拍卖行处获得被拍卖物品的所有权。
- 14.如果付款延迟,则需要支付等同于银行当时利率的违约利息,至少为符合 §288, 247 BGB (德国民法典) 规定的金额,保留进一步的损害赔偿要求(包括法律费用)。如果由于逾期付款而要求赔偿而不是支付款项,则也可将物品进行再一次拍卖,而因为在上一次拍卖中推迟付款而丧失其权利、不得继续竞拍的买方,须支付最低佣金并承担额外出售而产生的费用,并不得对可能产生的额外收益提出权利要求。
- 15.拍卖行有义务在拍卖后将物品立即寄送收货人。随着物品的转交,未受代理的损失和损坏的风险也转移给买方。出于买方(即中拍者)的要求,由其承担拍卖物品的运输费用和风险。运输保险费用由买方承担。送货后,买方(中拍者)须立即检查是否存在运输损坏,如存在须向运输公司呈报;如当时未发现损坏,则之后不得提出投诉反馈。
- 16. 商务往来的处理地和受理法院所在地为 Radevormwald。适用德国法律,不适用"联合国国际货物销售合同公约"(CISG)。
- 17.本条件同样适用于属于拍卖范畴内的后续售卖,远程销售合同的撤销和退回权不适用。
- 18.如果已存在的规定部分无效,则不影响其他部分的效力。
- 19.本订单条件具有多语言版本,其中德语版本为最权威版本。
